

Anna Asks: "What is a Doctor of the Church?" If you have a parish calendar with the saints' feast days listed, you may have noticed some saints are called "Doctors of the Church." When you see that, think PhD not MD. The title "doctor of the church" is afforded to saints whose writings and teachings are of particular importance; their works are considered to be both true and timeless. Through their research, study, and writing, they have advanced the Church's knowledge of our faith. To be declared a Doctor of the Church does not imply that all their writings are free from error but rather that the whole body of their work, taken together serves to advance the cause of Christ and his Church. The title was first given in the Middle Ages, and originally, there were four great Doctors of the Church. There are now 36, including four women saints. All these Doctors of the Church advanced the knowledge of God through their writing on theology, spirituality, mysticism, or through their defense of the faith in the face of heresy and schism.

Invitation to Eucharistic Adoration as a Family Jesus calls each of us to grow close to him every day. By visiting Jesus during adoration we form an intimate relationship with Him. At SEAS, we invite families to commit to making a visit just one Tuesday a month. If you've got little ones, try coming for the first 15 minutes on a Tuesday night – at 6:00pm. Deacon Bill or Fr. O'Connor place the Blessed Sacrament in the monstrance and it is displayed on the altar, surrounded by candelabras. A hymn is sung and incense is used as our prayers rise up. Silence then follows for the next couple of hours. Stay as long as your kids can be still. The other opportunity for families, perhaps older children, is to come for the final ten minutes at 7:50pm, when Benediction is celebrated. Again, the hymns, incense and solemn blessing are very memorable. These special moments with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament will bring grace to your own family and our parish family. Sign up for Eucharistic Adoration on Tuesday Evenings Parishioners are invited to commit to a variety of time slots each week. What works for you or your family? "Family Slots" are available for the first 15 minutes each Tuesday and the concluding 30 minutes. Others are encouraged to cover the full hour. Jesus asked his disciples, "So, you men could not keep watch with Me for one hour?" (Matthew 26:40) He asks us that same question 2,000 years later. Visit the website to sign up your family for this special time once each month... just twelve times each year.
