



Anna Asks: What is Divine Mercy Sunday? Divine Mercy Sunday originated when Our Lord appeared to Saint Faustina, a humble, Polish sister. During these visions, Jesus asked specifically that the Feast of Divine Mercy be established so that all people would turn to Our Lord and find refuge in him and in his unfathomable mercy. In the Divine Mercy image, Jesus is portrayed with one hand outstretched blessing the world, while his other hand rests on the side wounded by the soldier's spear. From the wound in his side stream blood and water. Below most images of the Divine Mercy are the words, "Jesus I Trust in You." Jesus told Sister Faustina: "This Feast emerged from the very depths of my mercy, and it is confirmed in the vast depths of my tender mercies. Every soul believing and trusting in my mercy will obtain it." Part of the day, can involve works of mercy – spiritual or corporal. Jesus explained to Sister Faustina that we can love our neighbors through deed, word, and prayer. There are three main components to the devotion of Divine Mercy: asking for and obtaining the mercy of God, trusting in Christ's mercy, and showing mercy to others. Divine Mercy Sunday is not just about God's mercy towards us, but about the mercy we show towards others as well. We are all in need of God's love and mercy but then we are called to give the love and mercy we receive to others.

Easter Flowers Thank you for the many lovely flowers which make our Worship Space alive with new life and new color for Easter. Many of these flowers were given in memory of loved ones. We are grateful for the gift of eternal life – the victory we celebrate as we recall Jesus' Resurrection – and pray that our loved ones may rest in the peace of that Kingdom which never ends.

<u>Celebrate Divine Mercy with your Family</u> The Church celebrates the gift of God's Divine Mercy on the First Sunday after Easter. If you are not familiar with this devotion, do yourself and your family a favor and google "Divine Mercy Novena." This will bring you the opportunity to learn more about this devotion. Saint Faustina is the one who brought it to the world just last century – in Church terms, that's fairly new. It was such a great gift to spend a "Year of Mercy" a couple years back, stir up that gift again in your life and in your family.

Mass Intention Offering The custom of requesting a Mass to be offered for a special intention has a long history in the Catholic Church. Remembering loved ones with a special mass intention is a great way for us as the "Church Militant" to support the "Church Penitent" on their way to the "Church Triumphant." This ancient practice is beautifully illustrated in the request of St. Monica to her son, the priest and Bishop, St. Augustine, "One thing only I ask you, that you remember me at the altar of the Lord." The offering for the Mass is given to the priest who celebrates the Mass. The suggested offering in the Diocese of Syracuse has been \$10 for a quite a while, even as neighboring dioceses have increased. The Diocese is raising the offering to \$15 for Masses celebrated after July 1.

Pancake Breakfast was a great success Thank you to Rick Phillips and Neal Mautz for heading up a team of generous volunteers who mixed, flipped, served, cleared and cleaned all morning. New connections were made and great food was served up. These parish events are very important to building community and supporting the growth of our parish. <u>Our Daily bREAD</u>- As we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday, let us be grateful of the grace Jesus pours out upon us. <u>John Paul II: The Great Mercy Pope</u>, by Fr. <u>Invitation to Adoration</u> On the Wednesday of the Easter Octave, the Church recalls Jesus' encounter with two of his disciples on the road to Emmaus. "And they said one to the other: Were not our hearts burning within us, whilst he spoke in this way, and opened to us the scriptures?" (Luke 24:32). The best way to encounter the Risen Christ is in His Sacraments, especially adoring Him in Eucharistic Adoration. Like the two disciples, we meet Christ face-to-face, though veiled, when we gaze upon the Blessed Host. There, in the Holy Eucharist, Our Lord opens the treasuries of His Sacred Heart to us. St EAS offers adoration on Tuesdays from 6 to 8 pm and Fridays from 7 to 9 am.

The Word of God and Mother Seton: "How sweet, the presence of Jesus to the longing, harassed soul! It is instant peace, and balm to every wound." The disciples locked the doors and hid in fear, but Christ was able to calm that fear with his presence. "Peace be with you;" with this simple greeting, He called the disciples out of their fear and into the peace of His Presence. Christ makes the same greeting to us, all He desires is to heal the wounds of our souls. To do this, He commissioned the disciples, once locked in by fear, to go out and forgive sins. As we celebrate Divine Mercy Sunday, may we open ourselves to that peace the Lord offers us through the Sacrament of Reconciliation.
